PROGRAM NOTES

A Tribute to the Armed Forces

The various anthems of our Armed Forces have a rather interesting history. The Army was the last branch to adopt a song, doing so in 1956 after receiving more than 800 submissions to a contest (and rejecting them all!). The refrain "Hi hi hee" was suggested by a class of first graders! The Marines' Hymn (yes, it's officially a hymn, and is always sung at attention) is the oldest, based on a tune written in 1867 by Jacques Offenbach and with a text that commemorates the Marines' victory in the 19th century Barbary Pirates War. The Coast Guard anthem dates from 1927 and was first plunked out on a dilapidated old piano at a remote Aleutian Island outpost. The Air Force song was chosen by a committee of Air Force wives from 757 entries received in a contest; it got its premiere performance at an air show in 1939. The Navy's "Anchors Aweigh" began as a football marching tune (in the words of its commission) "with swing to it so it . . . would live forever." It was debuted at an Army/Navy game in 1906 which the Navy won 10-0. To this day, at Navy boot camp at Great Lakes, Illinois, recruits are made to sing the anthem while marching through a tunnel.

Seventy-Six Trombones

"Seventy-Six Trombones" is the signature song from the 1957 musical *The Music Man*, written by Meredith Willson. In the play, "Professor" Harold Hill, a con man, masquerades as a traveling band instructor in order to swindle the residents of a small lowa

town out of all the money he can get from them. He proposes to create a boys' marching band with the money – a band that will rival the finest band (he says) that he ever heard – one that included 76 trombones, 110 cornets, and other equally astronomically numbered ranks of reeds, tubas, euphoniums, and even cannons! Of course, his plan is to hop the next train out of town with the money he collects. Now, every high school band instructor knows that even the finest marching band is lucky to attract far fewer than 76 trombone players and an even smaller number of cornetists, and certainly no cannons. Who could even imagine an orgy of brass such as Harold Hill envisioned? So much better to envision this lively number being sung by male choristers, don't you think?
